Our aim is that this will be a community of practice whose primary concern is the wellbeing of our clients. LEAF will contribute to the development, improvement and dissemination of best practice in support of the work of SWCC. The group will be meeting on a monthly basis to help us deliver better outcomes, as well as be a great resource not only for our Trustees, Chaplains and Mentors but to the wider Community Chaplaincy Association.

The LEAF team is currently looking at a number of projects. These include working alongside the Community Chaplains and our Mentors to support clients, sharing insight and motivation through their lived experience. They are also in the early stages of building a Community Award scheme to recognise and promote the good work of people across the criminal justice system and beyond. FINANCES


We are delighted to be able to report that with the wonderful grants and donations we have been given, we have been able to secure all the finances we need for this financial year and anticipate having a modest surplus. A huge thank you to all who have so generously given to support the work. We are now concentrating on the new financial year, which begins on the 1st April 2025, and so far we have been able to secure about 70% of the £227,000 we will need, leaving approximately a further £65,000 to find.

The story is told of a man who just loved old books. He spent hours searching in bookshops and auctions, and the walls of his house were lined with bookcases, containing ancient old tomes in lovely old bindings. His knowledge on old books was second to none.

One day, he was chatting to an acquaintance, who just happened to mention that he had been clearing out the attic of his ancestral home and had thrown out a dust-covered old Bible he found that had been sitting there for generations. As it says in our mission statement, 'The foundations of SWCC are derived from Christian faith-based principles, not least of hope, compassion, forgiveness, the intrinsic uniqueness and value of every person, and the possibility of change and renewal for all, regardless of what has happened in the past.'

A huge thank you to all our volunteers, supporters, staff, trustees and many others, who give of their time and their talents in so many different ways to value, to treasure and to bring hope to people of very great worth, whom society has mistakenly rejected.
